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The Devoted Life

At the LCMS convention in July, one of the preachers began his sermon with something to the effect: "If you want to make Christians feel guilty, just ask them about their devotional life." Experience teaches that many of us wish we were more devout in prayer and meditation on God's Word. Few seem to be content that they have done enough and most of us instead, acknowledge that we are all "works in progress" and in need of improvement. With this in mind, the 30th Annual Theological Symposium at Concordia Seminary, in St. Louis, took up the topic of "The Devoted Life." I was privileged to attend this conference last month and hear many lecturers from various perspectives present on the topic of devotion.

The symposium took place September 17th and 18th. I stayed with my brother-in-law who is a professor at the seminary and we enjoyed fun family times throughout the week in addition to attending the various lectures and worship at the seminary.

The first day of the conference, we attended plenary sessions and they were excellent. The first and perhaps the most provocative lecture was entitled: Discerning Devotion: Devotion and Discipleship in a Discontented Age. The speaker was Rev. Dr. David R. Schmitt. I took several classes with Dr. Schmitt more than 20 years ago, and he is as energetic and captivating as ever. He teaches homiletics (preaching) and his presentation showcased his profound gift for public speaking. He spoke without one single "um" or "ah" for 57 minutes. He moved all over the dais and raised and lowered his voice and gave his entire lecture without any notes. It was a good way to start the symposium with a powerful reminder of how a good presenter can cause you to hang on their every word.

In his lecture, Schmitt put forth a different definition from the traditional understanding of devotion. Most of us, when we hear that word used by Christians, take it to mean some kind of Bible reading, prayer and meditation, like the Psalmist describes in Psalm 1 "Blessed is the man whose ... delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night." Schmitt did not deny that this is devotion, but suggested we expand our understanding of devotion to include even more. The definition he put forth is: "Devotion is the deep reverence of an individual for a particular article of the Christian faith, often expressed in a variety of contemplative and active practices that manifest the working of the Spirit in that time and place." He goes on to explain that with such an understanding of devotion, Christians who may struggle with daily Bible study and prayer, nevertheless, may be profoundly devoted to some issue or cause which stems from their sincere Christian faith. For example, he said, some Christians are really moved to be involved with the pro-life cause and by their commitment to this issue,

they keep others in their Christian community (local congregation and other Christian friends) mindful of the tragedy of abortion. They say prayers, attend vigils, pass on literature and other things like this because they are truly devoted to this particular cause. All of this work is the fruit of a deeply held conviction to the divine mandate not to murder. This is a very different way of thinking about what it means to be devoted and a great way to start off the symposium with lots to consider.

Other lectures were more traditional. One spoke on the Psalms and learning to read them in a way that teaches us not to focus on ourselves and missing out on the sacred. Dr. Erik Herrmann, my brother-in-law, lectured on "Luther's Reform of the Devotional Life" which was a great historical overview of how Luther changed the way we think about and carry out the devotional life. Similarly, Professor John Pless from Concordia Theological Seminary in Ft. Wayne, IN lectured on "Praying the Small Catechism". Luther's Small Catechism is small enough that it can be memorized and, yes, prayed as an act of devotion. Pless has published a little book on this topic and more recently, he authored another titled: "Luther's Small Catechism: A Manual for Discipleship." Luther Himself spoke of praying the Catechism and urged Christians to do the same. When he used the term, "Catechism," he did not mean his own catechism with its six chief parts, but simply, the Lord's Prayer, the 10 Commandments, and the Apostle's Creed. This longstanding practice is worthy of your continued consideration.

Finally, I think the most practical takeaway I received, came from Rev. William Weedon, formerly Chaplain to the LCMS International Center (the synod's headquarters.) In his lecture, "On Habits of Daily Prayer," he said that Luther taught that in the home there are two altars: the bed and the table. By putting it this way, it makes the daily practice of prayer plain and simple: Every morning when you get up and before you get distracted and thinking about all the things you have to do, you should kneel at your bedside, make the sign of the cross and pray. Likewise, the last thing you should do before sleeping at night is to pray. The other times for prayer are when you sit down to eat at the table. This daily ritual at the "two altars"

of the home" is a simple and effective way to live out the Christian faith without lofty and (inevitably) unattainable goals that leave a Christian with guilt over their devotional life.




