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The Highest of All Virtues

The readings for last Sunday dealt with the topic of humility. This is an important subject for every Christian to consider. It is also a topic rather difficult to write about. The problem is, the main symptom of sin is selfishness and none of us is a perfect model of humility. Then there is also the difficult trap of false humility. This is the temptation to end up going on about humility so that you end up boasting about how humble you are! Fortunately, many have written well on the topic of humility and I came across many fine quotes in researching my recent sermon on humility. So, I thought I would simply share what some have said well on a topic I find so difficult to write about. I hope these cause you to reflect on the importance of humility and give you something to ponder in the days ahead.

We can start with the Bible itself. Psalm 131 which says:

A Song of Ascents. Of David.

¹O Lord, my heart is not lifted up;
my eyes are not raised too high;
I do not occupy myself with things
too great and too marvelous for me.

²But I have calmed and quieted my soul,
like a weaned child with its mother;
like a weaned child is my soul within me.

³O Israel, hope in the Lord
from this time forth and forevermore.

Saint Augustine of Hippo, a Church Father living in the late fourth and early fifth century, wrote to encourage a Christian friend: "I wish you to prepare for yourself no other way of seizing and holding the truth than that which has been prepared by [God]...in that way the first part is humility; the second, humility; the third, humility." This is sometimes epitomized as: "*For those who would learn God's ways, humility is the first thing, humility is the second, humility is the third.*"

He is also noted as saying: "It was pride that changed angels into devils; it is humility that makes men as angels."

Of course, Martin Luther wrote extensively on humility. (I say 'of course' because he wrote extensively on everything!) The following quotes are from *What Luther Says* by Ewald Plass. This book is a compendium of Luther quotes arranged by subject. The references are difficult to find as Plass refers to the German editions of Luther's works and not the more modern English translations, nevertheless, I highly recommend this book for anyone interested in learning more about Luther's thoughts on a wide range of topics.

Luther called humility "the highest of all virtues," but also warned against false humility. For example, here's what he said of the alleged humility of the monks:

Our humility is not monastic. Humility of that kind is pride and humility in oneself, not in Christ. Such humility is a sham. Those, then, are the proudest who are the humblest.

Again in pointing out the dangers in false humility, Luther compared the way truly humble people think with the way the falsely humble concern themselves with glory.

But the truly humble look not to the result of humility, but with a simple heart regard things of low degree and gladly associate with them. It never enters their minds that they are humble. Here the water flows from the well; here it follows naturally and as a matter of course that they will cultivate humble conduct, humble words, places, faces, and clothing, and, so far as possible, will shun great and lofty things. Thus David says in Ps. 131:1: "O Lord, my heart is not lifted up, my eyes are not raised too high." And Job 22:29 says: "He who has been humbled shall be in glory; and he who bows down his eyes shall be saved." Hence honors always come unexpectedly to them, and their exaltation is a surprise; for they have been content with their lowly station and have never aspired to the heights. But the falsely humble wonder why their glory and honor are so long in coming; their secret false pride is not content with their low estate but aspires in secret ever higher and higher.

True humility, therefore, never knows that it is humble, as I have said; for if it knew, it would turn proud from contemplation of so fine a virtue.

Perhaps Luther was at his best when he counseled Christians about in the true source of humility, namely our utter dependence on the grace of God:

A man cannot be thoroughly humbled until he gets to know that his salvation lies utterly beyond his own powers, counsels, efforts, will and works and depends absolutely on the pleasure, counsel, will and work of Another, namely, God alone. For if man, convinced that he is able to do the least thing toward his own salvation, retains confidence in himself and does not utterly despair of himself, he is not humble before God.

Similarly, Luther cautioned against Christians boasting and reiterated what Scripture makes so clear: that we earn nothing from God but all is a gift of grace:

In the world inequality of persons, ranks, and gifts must remain; but this does not make us unequal before our Lord God. For since nothing can stand before Him except grace, no one can possibly boast and strut in His presence...All of us should learn this and cling to His grace and mercy.... What we have, we have from Him alone: and of ourselves we have nothing but sin. Therefore no one should become overbearing, but everyone should humble himself and fear. For if there is good, it is the gift of our Lord God. He should boast of it, not you. But you should use it with thanksgiving and in the fear of God; for He cannot tolerate any strutting, any boasting or bragging.

I also really like this one from Charles Spurgeon, the great 19th century English preacher:

Humility is to make a right estimate of one's self.

Finally, let me leave you with one by 20th Century scholar and author, C.S. Lewis:

"If anyone would like to acquire humility, I can, I think, tell him the first step. The first step is to realize that one is proud. And a bigish step, too. At least, nothing whatever can be done before it. If you think you are not conceited, it means that you are very conceited indeed."
